Summary	of Pro	posed	Land	Uses

**Subsistence Agriculture (240 half-acre lots)** 387 acres

• Lessees are required to utilize their lots for agriculture or reside. Crops are expected to provide food to be consumed in the home or provide supplemental household income.

#### **Supplemental Agriculture**

63 acres

- Larger lots for supplement subsistence agriculture
- Larger lots would be for lessees who have the desire and capability to cultivate at a commercial-scale.
- Crops are expected to provide food to be consumed in the home or provide supplemental income.

#### Pastoral (12 10-acre lots)

110 acres

Intended for large lot agriculture specifically for pastoral uses.

#### **Community Use**

**152** acres

- To provide a central gathering place for community-building
- Land uses to be determined by the future homestead community.
- Possible uses include parks, community-based economic development, utilities, other facilities and amenities.

#### **Special District**

702 acres

- Areas requiring special attention because of unusual opportunities and/or constraints.
- These may include natural hazard areas, open spaces, raw lands far from infrastructure, mixed use areas, or greenways.



## HHC Water Policy Plan Development (2012 – 2014)

- Planning while doing
- Background Research
- Scoping Interviews
- 2013 beneficiary meetings (Hawai`i x 2, O`ahu x 3, Kaua`i, Molokai, Maui, Lāna`i)
- Key themes identified
- Feb 2014 Draft approved, ten more beneficiary meetings
- June 2014 approval



### **Key Policies of the WPP**

- 1. Expressly determine and plan for future water needs and actively participate in broader water management, use and protection efforts in Hawai'i in order to secure water.
- 2. Aggressively exercise, reclaim, and protect Hawaiian home land water kuleana.
- 3. Develop, manage, and steward water in a manner that balances cost, efficiency measures, and Public Trust uses in the short and long term.
- 4. Affirmatively communicate our decisions, our reasoning, and our performance in managing, stewarding, and using water before and after making major water decisions.



### **Priority Goals of the WPP**

- 1. Affirmatively communicate with beneficiaries regarding water decisions, performance, and water rights on a regional and annual basis.
- 2. Aggressively, proactively, consistently and comprehensively advocate for the kuleana of the beneficiaries, the DHHL, and the HHC to water before all relevant agencies and entities.
- 3. Develop and manage a Water Assets Inventory (WAI).
- 4. Support watershed protection and restoration on DHHL lands and source areas for DHHL water.
